# **Star Gazing Checklist**

(Cold Weather Star Gazing in Tennessee)



This checklist is written for the coldest weather star gazing events, such as the Geminid Meteor Shower in mid-December. Adjust the list as needed for warmer weather star gazing!

#### THE TEN ESSENTIALS

### 1. Navigation:

- a. <u>Know where to go</u>: Scope out your star gazing location in the daylight, so you know how to get there in the dark. Pick a spot away from the city lights.
- b. Star Chart: Know what part of the sky to look in
- c. Telescope: If you or someone in your group has one, bring it!

# 2. **Hydration**:

- a. <u>Hot Fluids</u>: Pack a thermos with hot water, and bring a few packets of hot cocoa cider and/or tea.
  - i. Are you 21 or older? Make it a hot toddy!
- b. <u>Water</u>: If you've found a really great star gazing spot, more than likely you are not near a drinkable water source, so bring a few bottles of water.

#### 3. **Nutrition**:

- a. <u>Picnic</u>: Is the sun setting early enough to enjoy a picnic dinner under the stars? Pack some sandwiches or grab a meal-on-the-go on your way.
- b. Snacks: Bring a combination of sweet, salty, and fruity snacks.
- 4. **Sun Protection**... actually, don't worry about this one!

#### 5. **Insulation**:

- a. <u>Blankets & Pillows</u>: Bring at least 2 blankets. You'll want one blanket to lie out on the grass, and another blanket to wrap yourself in. Don't forget a pillow!
  - i. If it's really cold, consider bringing a sleeping bag to crawl into
- b. <u>Clothing</u>: Dress for the overnight lows! It could be 60 degrees when you leave the house and 32 degrees when you settle onto your blanket. Keep yourself comfortable.
  - i. Long pants & long sleeve shirt
  - ii. Coat, Sweatshirt, scarf, hat & mittens

#### 6. Warmth:

- a. <u>Hand Warmers</u>: Stuff them in your shoes, mittens, and the bottom of your sleeping bag! The stars are more beautiful when you're warm.
- b. Hot Fluids: See "Hydration" above!

## 7. **Illumination**:

- a. <u>Headlamp</u>: It's bad form to have lights on when star gazing, especially with a group, but you'll need to see where you're going. Bring a headlamp, preferably one with a red light.
- 8. **First Aid:** It's not a bad idea to have a kit in your car, and jumper cables too
- 9. **Shelter**: Check out our Car Camping Checklist if this is an overnight event
- 10. **Safety:** Cell phone. Be sure to let others know where you'll be.
